Summer According to Humphrey (*Series*) by Betty Birney.

Trouble with Chickens by Doreen Cronin.

Ho'olnani: Hula Warrior by Heather Gale. Multi

Ho'onani feels in-between. She doesn't see herself as wahine (girl) OR kane (boy). She's happy to be in the middle. But not everyone sees it that way.

Ideas All Around by Philip Christian Stead.

In search of writing ideas, an author takes a walk with his dog around the neighborhood where he finds that ideas really are all around, you just have to know what to do with them.

Let the Children March by Monica Clark-Robinson. Coretta Scott King Honor Award.

The story of a trailblazing woman. Grace Hopper coined the term "computer bug" and taught computers to "speak English." Throughout her life, Hopper succeeded in doing what no one had ever done before. A role model for science- and math-minded girls and boys.

Her Fearless Run: Kathrine Switzer's historic Boston Marathon by Kim Chaffee

This narrative biography follows Kathrine from running laps as a girl in her backyard to becoming the first woman to run the Boston Marathon with official race numbers in 1967.

Malala's Magic Pencil by Malala Yousafzai. Multi

She saw a world that needed fixing. Malala, the youngest recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize, tells the story of her life.

On the morning of August 6, 1926, Gertrude Ederle stood on the beach at Cape Gris-Nez, France, and faced the churning waves of the English Channel. Twenty-one miles across the perilous waterway. Ederle broke records and became the first woman to swim across the Channel.

WHOOSH! Lonnie Johnson's SUPER-SOAKING Stream of Inventions by Chris Barton. Lonnie Johnson, a NASA engineer, is best known for inventing the Super Soaker water gun, one of the top twenty toys of all time — and it was invented by accident!
