In my advisory, we discuss current events, and as interesting as these discussions are, think about

how much more interesting they would be if they included input from Form III-Form VI Students.

Mixed grade level advisories would also give students the opportunity to meet other students they might not normally interact with. This new advisory system would help blur the clear-cut lines that divide the grades, and it would foster a more united community.

For those of you who do not like the idea of mixed advisories, there is no need to worry; the new system probably will not be implemented. That said, I still encourage each and every member of the student body to at least think about branching out and forming friendships with both younger and older students.

Student Government can certainly facilitate the process, and I can see that they have already been trying. Last year, the "SoPhresh" Dance was created exclusively for underclassmen, since they do not go to prom. It was a terrific opportunity for ninth and tenth graders to mingle but unfortunately the turnout underachieved.

It may not be in Student Government's power to change the advisory system, but it can continue to promote the integration of different grades by creating more multi-grade events and activities. In the end, though, their efforts can only go so far. It is up to the students to take advantage of our resources and unify the different age groups that comprise our student body.


